



With outpatient and residential mental health services, substance use services, emergency services, school-based therapy, case management services, and more, our Regional Mental Health Center programs work to make our clients feel whole again.





### **PRIMARY HEALTH**

#### We're Invested in our Community for a Healthier Tomorrow.

The need for affordable, quality, and integrated health care for Lake County's population suffering from behavioral health issues is high. Furthermore, adults with mental illness and substance use disorders have higher rates of chronic physical illnesses and are more likely to have shorter lifespans. Through Regional Health Clinic, we continue to change the physical health disparities of our service communities by providing streamlined affordable and accessible health care.





### **FAMILY SERVICES**

Each year family service programs at Geminus reach thousands of Hoosiers in Lake County, providing critical social service resources to support local children and families.

#### **Circle Around Families (CAF)**

Families with children exhibiting emotional and behavioral problems, who are at risk of placement outside the home, are supported through a cross system of care with individualized care plans to help support the child and family. Children are referred by the Lake County Juvenile Justice Court System and the Indiana Department of Child Services.

New Clients Supported: 50
Total Cases Closed: 52

#### **Community Partners**

For families seeking to manage obstacles such as job loss, behavioral issues, domestic violence, addiction, and other concerns, Community Partners provides assistance including job counseling, parenting classes, and advice on how to make use of local community services that help keep families healthy, happy, and together. Last year, through its programs and events, Community Partners reached:

#### **Abuse Intervention Management**

As the only state-certified batterers intervention program in Lake County serving men and women, participants receive both one-one-one counseling and group counseling by a certified domestic violence therapist. We work to keep children and families safe in a healthy environment to begin the process for change.

#### **Real Fathers Initiative**

To increase the involvement of fathers' roles in the lives of their children, we focus on teaching fathers how to be effective parents and how to engage with their children. With counseling on an educational, vocational, and family planning level, participants also collaborate with a family advocate to assist with housing, transportation, employment assistance, and visitation with children, and more.

#### **Truancy Prevention Program**

To assist families dealing with truancy issues, we partner with Lake County school corporations to address challenges before they escalate to the county juvenile court system and the Indiana Department of Child Services.

# PREVENTION SERVICES

To continue the change for a healthier tomorrow through mental health awareness and community engagement, we work tirelessly to prevent and reduce alcohol, tobacco, and illicit drug use—and stop suicide.

#### **Partnership for Success Grant**

The Lake County Partnership for Success works with Hammond High, Hobart High, and Hobart Middle Schools to implement two evidence-based drug-use prevention programs: Project Towards No Drug Abuse and Too Good for Drugs. We also continue to partner with the U.S. DEA to promote two National Prescription Drug Take Back Days. Local Students Involved: 970

#### **Lake County Substance Abuse Block Grant**

Our team partners with several Lake County organizations to provide prevention programs—such as Al's Pals, Too Good for Drugs, and a social norms campaign—to reach thousands of local Hoosiers, including preschoolers, pre-teens, and college students.

Lake County Residents Reached: 95,880

#### Youth L.E.A.D. (Leading and Educating Across Domains)

Built on youth-empowerment, this statewide evidence-inspired prevention program promotes youth leadership. Our team partners with many local youth-based organizations, training students to co-facilitate a youth-driven, innovative approach to reduce and prevent alcohol, tobacco, and drug abuse.


#### **Elder L.E.A.D (Leading and Educating Across Domains)**

Tailored to the unique needs of the senior population, this statewide Mental Health Awareness and Substance Use/Abuse Prevention initiative, we address the gaps in the resources available in Indiana. Senior Citizens Served: 105

#### **NWI LGBTQ Coalition**

We work with community groups, educators, healthcare providers, and social service agencies to promote substance abuse prevention and mental health awareness for members of the LGBTQ community. Through a network of LGBTQ groups throughout Northwest Indiana, we also provide training and resources, such as the Northwest Indiana Suicide Prevention Council's Faces of Suicide Conference.

#### **Making Students Successful Initiative**

By providing social services to children, parents, caregivers, and teachers in Lake County, our team's purpose is to prevent substance abuse, promote healthy behaviors, and maximize student success. The initiative incorporates three school based, student centered programs: coping and support training, ripple effect and signs of suicide.

### **EARLY LEARNING**

As early childhood education supporters, we know that all child care is early learning. The demand for access to affordable, high-quality early childhood education in Northwest Indiana is so much greater than the current availability. That's why Geminus's early learning programs such as Early Head Start, Head Start, On My Way Pre-K, Paths to QUALITY™, and other child care partnerships are so important. These programs not only help increase access to affordable, quality early childhood education, they also empower parents to become advocates and participants in their child's education.

#### **Early Learning Connections**

We recognize that familiarity with the key indicators of quality child care is important. Families receive localized information about the variety of available child care that meet their specific needs and gain access to models of high-quality child care programming. Indiana programs like **Paths to QUALITY™** and **On My Way Pre-K** help parents judge a provider's quality standards.

Child care providers receive professional development in early childhood care and education, assistance with starting child care home-based business, training on Indiana state licensing requirements and best practices, and coaching to ensure quality program operation.

#### Northwest Indiana Child Care Development Fund (CCDF) Voucher Program


This State of Indiana child care voucher program assists income-eligible families in Jasper, Lake, Porter, and Newton counties with affordable child care opportunities. Access to vouchers helps families in need obtain child care so parents can work, attend trainings or continue their education.

#### **Daily Bread**

Specifically geared towards increasing a child's access to nutritious meals while in child care, Daily Bread reimburses child daycare homes and centers with funding from USDA Child & Adult Care Feeding Program. We ensure child care homes and centers meet CACFP standards for enrolled children, and we provide training in menu planning and preparation as well as sanitation and administration.

Our longest running early childhood education program, it is also Northwest Indiana's leader in early childhood education—making positive impacts on families, children, and staff through creative partnerships that inspire personal growth, foster empowerment and provide quality comprehensive services for all. We make it convenient for families to access quality early learning and social services.
